

Meeting Minutes

- 1. Leadership Council Meeting Introduction
 - a. Beth Svetlic called the meeting to order.
 - b. Attendance is recorded after minutes.
- 2. Discussion & Approval of:
 - a. Approval of October Minutes
 - Beth Svetlic called for a motion to approve September minutes. We will do this at the next meeting.
 - b. Review and Approve FY24 NOFO Priority Ranking* Joshua Knowles
 - There was no quorum to vote so we will update the results of this vote as soon as we have them.
- 3. Lead Agency Updates
 - a. Strategic Planning Updates, Nancy Curry
 - i. We are focusing on refreshing the existing strategic plan, not creating a new one.
 - ii. Better service coordination and maximizing Medicaid resources.
 - iii. Our next steps are to add Community input through feedback forms and spreading the word to ensure broad participation.
 - iv. Shift to getting people experiencing homelessness into housing and ensuring longterm stability.
 - v. Using collective voice to amplify needs and advocate for policy reforms to improve housing access.
 - vi. Potential for higher HUD allocation and exploring additional funding options.
 - vii. Upcoming meetings and events: **October 18th:** Combined meeting of the PAG and YAB at noon, **October 29th:** Virtual town hall to discuss the strategic plan and answer questions, **November:** All-member meeting for Way Home for Tulsa partner
 - viii. organizations, with a dedicated session on the strategic plans.
 - ix. The draft version of the plan is available with links to the feedback form.
 - x. Attendees are encouraged to review the draft and provide feedback.
 - b. October Communications, Erin Velez
 - i. Focus on the root causes of homelessness for October.
 - ii. Encouraging communication personnel to share prepared messages and images.



- iii. Shifting the narrative from personal responsibility to collective system support.
- iv. Summary of services accessed through the continuum of care, with nearly 17,000 individuals served this year.

c. Data Dashboards, Oliva Denton Koopman

- i. 34 of 45 units occupied (75% utilization), with ongoing efforts to prepare remaining units.
- ii. Emphasized the need for unified data on both housed and unhoused individuals.
- iii. Approximately 3,000 individuals are awaiting housing, including those in various shelters.
- iv. 395 youths (ages 16-24) engaged with care services, noting discrepancies in hidden homelessness.
- Adherence to HUD's narrow definition contrasts with McKinney-Vento's broader scope, which includes about 2,500 students facing homelessness.
- vi. Standardized data collection required by state law, with smaller districts facing implementation challenges.
- vii. Significant shortages for families, especially those with multiple children and those on the HUD waiting list.
- viii. McKinney-Vento includes doubled-up households, impacting school attendance and stability.
- ix. Focus on expanding housing stability and prevention efforts to more school districts.

4. Meeting Wrap-Up

a. Public Comments

- i. CcC Builds NOFO:
 - 1. HUD's new funding opportunity from unspent or unallocated funds.
 - Focus on permanent supportive housing development, acquisition, or renovation.
 - 3. National competition with \$175 million available, \$65 million reserved for low-population states.
 - 4. Tulsa's cap is around \$5 million per application, with potential for two applications if involving tribal entities.
 - 5. Application deadline around November 21st or 22nd.
- ii. Emergency Rent Assistance:



- 1. Restore Hope spent nearly \$70 million to help almost 20,000 families.
- 2. Last funds spent on September 27th.
- 3. Limited resources available for the next 15 months.
- 4. New restrictions on eligibility and assistance due to reduced funding.
- 5. Focus on individuals experiencing domestic violence, previously incarcerated, previously homeless, and families with children.
- 6. Income eligibility is limited to under 50% of the area median income.
- 7. Special funding received from various foundations.
- 8. Ongoing applications for additional funding.
- 9. Encouragement to introduce potential donors to support homelessness prevention.
